

## **Bloomfield High School Teacher Wins Environmental Education Grant**

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Bloomfield High School teacher Michael Doyle now has extra money to supplement his students' lesson plans with hands-on learning, thanks to a \$1,917.45 grant from PSEG.

The energy company has awarded over \$25,000 this year to New Jersey educators who successfully linked their students' understanding of math, science, computer science and technology with an enthusiasm and appreciation for the environment.

Doyle plans to teach ninth graders about the world's four remaining horseshoe crab species and their relationship to the environment. In addition to a planned field research activity at Sandy Hook, students are expected to create horseshoe crab art, to be exhibited in an annual contest for students along the Atlantic coast. Doyle's project aims to give students a deeper appreciation of the diversity of life forms found in their New Jersey backyard

and help them gain a sense of empowerment when dealing with environmental issues. This experience will also afford many of the students the chance to handle a horseshoe crab for the first time, and for some, their first-ever visit to the ocean.

"Environmental education is fundamental to helping New Jersey's youth become responsible world citizens, and offers creative ways for both students and teachers to tie their appreciation of nature to academics," said Vaughn McKoy, PSEG Foundation president. "We remain strongly committed to supporting the efforts of our grantees. This successful partnership continues to provide kids and the general public with a better understanding of the environment and environmental issues."

The PSEG Foundation has awarded Garden State educators over \$358,000 since starting its Environmental Education grant program 19 years ago.

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
